SAFE ROWING ON MUD LAKE

Recently, Hannes Hofer, one of the Rice students and I removed all of the remaining underwater obstacles between the second and third telephone poles from the far shore. This is where you are supposed to go when heading upstream. pole. It's kind of scary to think that all that stuff was just below the surface of the water.

Just a reminder - the official traffic pattern for Mud Lake is to stay to the right, like driving a car. Boats going upstream should stay to the side of the lake near the boathouse shore. Boats rowing toward NASA Road 1 should stay to the side of the lake near the opposite shore. Boats crossing the lake should give those rowing up or down the right

of way. When going between the telephone poles, go between the second and third pole from the far shore while heading upstream. Go between the far shore and the first pole when heading toward NASA Road 1. Leave the middle set of poles as a safety area.

EQUIPMENT CARE

We have been pretty lucky to date with our shells and oars. There have been no significant repair jobs due to accidents. (Knock on wood!!!) We have, as would be expected, experienced some breakage due to wear and tear, but we can minimize the amount of this kind of repair with a little attention.

We don't really have a sucker, I mean volunteer, to head up equipment maintenance. Repairs are usually made by the person who needs the broken equipment. Obviously, it would be great if we had someone to go to and report problems and who could plan some preventative maintenance. But without such a magnanimous person or group of persons, here are some things you should consider when handling equipment which should help prolong its useful life.

These tips apply to both sweep and sculling equipment.

• Allow Time

This is probably the simplest thing you can do to help care for the equipment. When you plan your rowing time, remember to schedule in time to care for the equipment. Rowing is more than pulling on oars. You must be prepared to spend a little time on YOUR shell to make sure it is in good shape for the next person to use. Get to know the equipment and ask questions of others if you are not sure if something is wrong or not.

Before you row, inspect the equipment for any loose nuts or broken parts. Don't row if something is not right.

• Washing

After every practice, wash the inside and outside of the hull. Don't forget the riggers. Just because aluminum does not rust that does not mean it won't corrode. Wipe the boats down as much as possible. There were actually mushrooms growing from under the tracks in one of the fours recently! (No towels?? Maybe it's time to go buy some new ones for your home and donate your old ones to the boathouse!) Hang the towels up after use on the "clothes line" between the first set of racks in the middle of the boathouse so they will dry out for the next person. Don't just throw them anywhere.

If there is a scum line on the shell, wipe it off with a rag or your hand. That stuff builds up over time. Yuck... If there

is a permanent looking scum line, consider buying some car polishing compound and polish the shell to remove it. Remember, this is YOUR equipment. YOU row it. You should keep it in shape.

Every few times you use the shell, place it upright in a set of slings and give it a good scrub on the inside. Wipe out the tracks. It may appear that grease has been placed in them. Any gunk there is not intentional.

Wipe it out. Wipe the wheels off, too.

• Seats

If your seats come out of the shell, intentionally or not, set them down in such a manner that the wheels do not touch the ground. In other words, place them wheels up. If you have several, stack the others on top of the first one, etc...

If your seat moans and creaks or sticks while rowing, something's not right. If you do not feel comfortable tinkering with it to make it work smoothly, call me at the number below and I will try to work on it.

• Placing the shell in the water

Avoid contact of the shell with the dock when placing it in the water. Seems pretty obvious, but you'd be surprised. Recreational singles can get away with being placed on the dock, but even these should be placed in the water rather than being slid in. Crews should all face the center of the shell when placing the shell in the water or slings. In this way, you can see what the shell is doing and keep it level. Press down on the gunwale near you to keep the shell level from side to side and the fin away from the dock, a common source of damage.

• Oars

Wash 'em after every use. Keep the collars out of the dirt. Wipe the collars off with a rag every once in a while. When you hang the oars in the racks, make sure they are not swinging when you leave them. They start to rock back and forth and walk right out of the rack. Spoooooooky!

Never lean oars up against a wall or a tree. The wind could blow them over. Composite oars should not be left lying in the sun for prolonged periods. When you're done, put 'em up. I noticed that

there is at least one pair of wooden club sculls that are in dire need of repair. The varnish won't just jump out of the can onto them. Consider sanding and varnishing them yourself.

• Foot stretchers

Don't force them. If they are difficult to move, try to determine what is making them bind. If a screw is sticking up from the track, get a screwdriver and screw it back in. If the stretchers are crooked, that can cause them to bind. Gently tap them straight. Loose the wing nut enough to lift the stretcher slightly. On the Schoenbrod shells, you must also lift a little plastic piece with the stretcher. It seems like it take three hands to do it, but a little patience works pretty well.

Have you ever gotten into a boat and had to put your feet into yucky shoes? Can be gross, huh? "Why don't they replace these?", you ask. Well, there simple is no "they". You and I are "they." Consider bringing a new pair with you next time to replace the old ones.

• Tools

Yes, tools need care, as well. If you use one, put it back where you found it. This is where a little planning can help. Too often I have seen people grab tools in a rush and then run off with them or just return them to the desk instead of the workbench. Look in the desk next time you're at the boathouse. Chances are there will be a wrench or a screwdriver in there...

• Summary

I know I have rambled a bit here, but our equipment is getting old. It is still in good shape, but we can't forget why it is in good shape - people take time to care for it. If you make attention to the equipment part of your routine, it will last much longer. Just have a look at the time private shell owners put into their equipment. You should treat the club equipment the same way.

BARC AND RRC SOLIDIFY ALLIANCE WITH SIGNED CONTRACT

The long awaited agreement between the Rice Rowing club (RRC) and BARC was ceremoniously signed on February 18. Simply stated, the agreement says RRC can store their two 8+'s and use the Karankawa when BARC crews have not scheduled it. In return, RRC pays BARC a membership fee, storage fees for the two 8+'s, and a rental fee for the Karankawa.

We see much of the Rice Crew these days. It's great to see such activity at the boathouse. Since there is so much going on at once, remember to stay alert when in the boathouse.

There are a couple of components of the agreement that you should know about. RRC members are bound to the rules that appear in the Membership Handbook, just as you and I are. In addition, the agreement says that the combination to the boathouse is to be given only to the RRC coaches. Help us keep the boathouse secure by referring questions regarding the combination to the Club Treasurer. When opening or closing the boathouse, please spin the numbers on the padlock to conceal the combination.

Since RRC is using our equipment, it is vital that you schedule the use of the 4+'s with Paula Berman, our "Scheduling Goddess". We have agreed to schedule the Raj before the Karankawa. However, if two BARC crews schedule both 4+'s at the same time, the BARC crew will have priority use of the Karankawa. RRC will then have to negotiate with Paula for another time.

I hope you join me in looking forward to a long and favorable relationship with the RRC. If anything develops that you are concerned about, please see a board member, speak to Hannes Hofer or the RRC launch driver. During this first year of the agreement, the board is monitoring the terms of the contract, and may modify them if necessary.
